What is the pillar of Fellowship of the Mat all about? More importantly, what does it take to be apart of this kind of fellowship? The concept of this pillar comes from Mark 2:1-12. In this account you see several friends who are carrying a paralytic on a bed mat to Jesus to be healed. When they arrive at the house, there is no room to get in the front door, so they decided to carry him to the roof of the house and lower him to Jesus. They had one mission in mind...



The beautiful part is that Christ demonstrated each of these qualities for us. He was compelled by the love of His Father in heaven to come and rescue. Christ constantly demonstrated a priority of affection towards the sick, hurting, lost, weak, rejected, fatherless, etc. They were treasures in his eyes. He was genuine and vulnerable before his disciples. Christ trusted in the Father fully, even to the point of death. Repeatedly Christ would take about speaking only what he heard the father speak and doing the will of the Father. He fully entrusted himself to the Father. He was always willing to gather around not only the disciple's mats of unbelief, weakness, illness, and flawed thinking but also those that came to him. Christ even demonstrated his willingness to be carried in the garden as he prayed about the cup being taken from him if possible. He was always ready to teach, correct and rebuke his disciples when necessary out of love and knowing that truth brought life. Christ was willing to see it to completion, and pursued that goal unto the cross stating that it was finished. Even now, he continues to stand beside the Father interceding for us and gave us the Holy Spirit to enable us to accomplish the mission.



The love of Christ compels and motivates you. We must abide in a personal relationship with Christ, knowing He is what we need. Anything else that motivates us will result in a limited desire to invest in others.



Be vulnerable and trust those around you. We need to be willing to take the surface level mask off and trust others to get close.

We are learning that God is called by many names in the Bible. We are focusing on two names in our small group discipleship this second quarter. Ms. Stewart and I are using "Good Shepherd" and "Alpha and Omega" as our two names to learn and focus on.

"Good Shepherd" comes from John 10:11-18 and Luke 15. We talked about how God is our good shepherd and how He loves us. Arbor Counseling provides consultation and supportive services to the staff and students at New Hope Christian Academy. Carrie DeBord, Licensed Professional Counselor at Arbor, is currently in her second year of working with NHCA. As a result of this partnership, when a need for support or counseling services is recognized, school principals arrange a time for the student to work with Carrie during the designated school hours. These hours are typically Mondays through Thursdays from 9am to 11am. Carrie works with students facing challenges related to classroom struggles, ADHD, peer conflicts, crisis, social skills, grief/loss, and emotional issues along with other life challenges that may impact the students' academic performance as well as their lives outside of the classroom. These services are free for students and families, and typically consist of approximately halfhour, solution-focused sessions for wellness.

Carrie gives presentations to classes based on classroom needs which have included building student skills in communication and conflict resolution; managing anxiety and emotions; bullying; and building social skills. Teachers may also consult with Carrie regarding student concerns and challenges.

Arbor Counseling is a faith-based counseling center which serves Central Ohio with offices in Dublin, Grove City, Marysville, and Circleville.
