SEEK FIRST THE KINGDOM OF GOD

Just about any school has an overarching vision and goal of educating and preparing students to be productive citizens for their future. This is certainly important and a definite focus for our students. We are committed to providing a rigorous and relevant educational experience for our students, but we have a different end in mind. We are not just another school with the same goals and vision. Our constant focus and goal is to be centered around seeking first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness. Our greatest desire is to know God personally and intimately on a daily basis. No matter what goes on around us, it is critical to never lose sight that following Christ is a way of life, where our eyes remain fixed on Him. Matthew 6:33 says, "But seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things will be added to you." Psalm 27:4 says, "One thing have I asked of the Lord, that will I seek after: that I may dwell in the house of the Lord all the days of my life, to gaze upon the beauty of the Lord and to inquire in his temple." One elementary and one high school student were recognized at last month's school board meeting for their efforts in displaying one or more of the six pillars of New Hope Christian Academy.

Karsyn Cline is one of our kindergarten students who consistently demonstrates the qualities of a Statesman. Even in her family interview last spring, Karsyn expressed that she wanted to attend a school where she could learn more about God. Karysn's parents, David and Malesa, felt it was important for her to be hearing the same message at home, church, and school about the awesome love of God.

Karsyn always has a smile on her face and is a great friend to her classmates. She has said that chapel and Bible are her favorite parts of the day. Karsyn is a true example of a little girl who has a thirst for knowing more about Christ.

Her teacher explains further that, "Karsyn loves to talk about Jesus and she has an amazing understanding of His love for us and our need to have Him in our lives. She will share in both class and chapel enthusiastically.

Earlier this month, we were talking about Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego. With great boldness, Karsyn spoke up and stated that even though the three men may have been scared being thrown in the fiery furnace, Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego did the right thing. They knew that bowing down to an idol was wrong and that they should only worship the one true God. She continued to say that God was with them and never left them while they were in the fire. She understood that God does same for us... in our lives. He is with us at home, church, school...wherever we go. God is with us when we are scared to try something new. He is with us during school when it may be difficult to tell a friend that they hurt our feelings. All we have to do is ask for His help."

Karsyn was recognized for her demonstration of Pillar 1: Seeking First the Kingdom of God; and Pillar 2: Leaving an Eternal Legacy. Tessa Finkle, one of our high school juniors, is not only a hardworking young lady, but she also displays three of the pillars of a Statesman.

Recently, Tessa shared a project that her youth group started at her church and brought up the idea of implementing it here at New Hope. She presented the following idea: "What would it look like if each girl in our discipleship group took in a middle school girl as part of a mentorship program? It would be cool if they had one of us to help them through middle and high school. We could encourage them, eat lunch with them, pray for and with them, and just be a friend to them. I mean, we know what they're going through because we've been through it too."

This action on Tessa's part demonstrates everything that we want our students here at New Hope to possess: to see a need and not expect someone else to respond, but to initiate change themselves. This program is something that excites our young women and allows them to leave a legacy with their fellow students. It shows, firsthand, how we can walk through life with each other and carry one another during difficult times. It builds a bridge between middle school and high school students and creates a culture of acceptance and love.

Noah spoke about how Romans 12:1-2 has been evident in his life as he strives to live out God's plan for his life.

I was desperate for something I needed more than anything. I was desperate for something that would quench my "appetite". That something was actually someone, the ONLY one that can fill any void-JESUS!



The story of Bartimaeus (the blind beggar) in John 9 and Luke 18. It may be a lot easier to simply read from the pages of a book, but it is way more fun and memorable if someone does something to bring a story to life. So, even though I looked ridiculous, and felt a bit embarrassed, I dressed up, complete with beard and mustache and acted the role as the "blind man". We learned that this blind man was blind since birth and he was DESPERATE for a change in his life. The only one that could heal him was Jesus, and when he heard Jesus was there, he cried out in desperation for Jesus to heal him. In this story, Jesus took some dirt, added his own spit, and put this now mud on the blind man's eyes. In our story, I didn't want to bring dirt into the school and I definitely didn't want preschool spit on me, so I brought chocolate pudding (our new mud). The fun part was allowing them to act like Jesus and let them smear the chocolate pudding all over my eyes! Gross, perhaps, memorable - you bet! According to God's word, once this blind man was obedient to Jesus and washed the mud off - he was healed and was able to see!

The Paralytic Man and his Friends - Mud and

others. Jesus heals the paralyzed man - Mark 2:1-12 and Luke 5:17-26. In this true story there was a paralyzed man who desperately needed Jesus. He was DESPERATE for a change in his life. The only one that could heal him was Jesus. When his friends heard Jesus was there, they did whatever they could to get their paralyzed friend to Jesus. Restricted to a mat, the four friends carried him to the place where Jesus was. They tried to simply take him through the front door but the place was packed. Even outside the door, there was no room. The friends didn't give up! They didn't let obstacles get in the way of getting their friend to Jesus! In bible times, homes were built of stone and had flat roofs made with mud mixed with straw and or mud tiles. These friends got their paralyzed friend up on the roof, then started taking the roof apart! They took apart as much of the mud structure as was necessary to make a hole big enough for their friend to fit through.

Only after all their hard work, could they then lower their friend through the hole in the roof, right in front of Jesus! God's word says that Jesus saw their faith, not just the paralytic's faith but the faith of the friends. Then, Jesus not only healed their sins, but also healed their paralyzed friend. "Immediately the paralyzed man stood up, took his mat, and went home praising God, and those watching were amazed, and gave praise to God!" The preschoolers were very happy that our froggy friend was healed and was able to hop back home too.

All of us fit into either one (or both) of these stories because we all need Jesus, but ARE WE DESPERATE ENOUGH? Maybe there is something going on in your life and you feel "restricted" like the blind man or the paralyzed man. Are we willing like the blind man to "call out" to Jesus? Only Jesus can truly heal/change anyone. What if people rebuke and tell you to be quiet? Like the blind man, "shout all the more" in desperation to Jesus! You will be changed! Jesus is there and Jesus is wanting to give you EVERYTHING you need! Just like our ELC January memory verse states, "You (Jesus) are EVERYTHING I need." Psalm 119:57. Maybe Jesus is the LORD of your life, but we all know someone who needs to be taken to Jesus so they can be "healed/changed". (Like the paralytic and the four friends.) Are we desperate enough to do whatever it takes to get our friends to the only one that can truly help them?

Yes, there will be obstacles and it will be hard work, but Matthew 17: 20-21 states that "even with faith as small as a mustard seed, you can say to this mountain, 'Move from here to there' and it will move. Nothing will be impossible for you." Our faith affects others! We cannot make another person a Christian, but we can do whatever it takes to give them a chance to respond to the one they need the most – JESUS!

I pray we recognize the desperate need and respond.
